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A CHRISTMAS CONUNDRUM – BY MONTY DART

Martyn Evans is a fond supporter of Friends of Tredegar House. Without him we wouldn't have some of the unique photographs in the Servant's Corridor, or Housekeeper's Room. He has also contributed articles about his grandparents Jack (Pop) Evans, who was the chauffeur to Courtenay and Evan Morgan and Hannah, Housekeeper at TH.

However, one of his latest donations is indeed a conundrum. Amongst other artefacts, he discovered a box in a chest of drawers in his late Mother's house. It was labelled 'Lady Tredegar, 43 Grosvenor Square', the handwritten date is February 27th 1939. Martyn had never seen the box before and his Mother had never mentioned it. The box was from Woolland Bros. Knightsbridge, SW1 an upmarket retailer of clothing and haberdashery.

Inside the box, wrapped in blue tissue was a christening gown, with two blue ribbons sewn on it. Nowadays we almost take it for granted that parents can know the gender of a child before it is born. Not so in 1939. So the blue tissue paper and blue ribbons indicate that a baby boy had been born, but whose baby? At that time Princess Olga Dolgoruky had just married Evan Morgan so she would be 'Lady Tredegar' so would Katharine, Evan's Mother, who retained her title as she and her husband Courtenay had never divorced - neither candidates for a christening gown. Was it a present for a devoted servant? Martyn can't link the birth of a baby boy in his family. Family historians, I leave it to you!

AN EXTRACT FROM FRIENDS OF TREDEGAR HOUSE 1990/91 ANNUAL REPORT

1990/91 was a very successful year for purchases, a number of highly important objects being acquired for the collection.

THE MORGAN MEDAL COLLECTION -

In July a collection of 23 medals associated with members of the Morgan family, together with a silhouette of Godfrey, Viscount Tredegar, an ivory coach pass belonging to Sir Charles Morgan (1760-1846) and other memorabilia, were acquired at public auction at Christies, London for £4,840. The Museums and Galleries Commission contributed £2,420 towards the cost.

These medals were awarded to three members of the family: Godfrey Viscount Tredegar: his brother the Hon. Frederick Charles Morgan; and Courtenay, Viscount Tredegar. They range in date from 1855 to 1926 and commemorate the family's involvement in the Crimean War, the Boer War and the First World War. The medals are now on display in the Side Hall.

ON LOAN -

Portrait of the Hon. Evan Morgan, later Viscount Tredegar by Ambrose McEvoy, c1914.

This charming three quarter length portrait of the young Evan Morgan by one of the most successful society portraitists of the early twentieth century is now on display in Evan's former bedroom, the King's Room. It was formerly part of the Tredegar collection.

TREDEGAR HOUSE UPDATE DECEMBER 2018

As we get ready to say hwyl fawr to 2018 I wanted to pause and think about some of the great things we have been up to this year.

We secured whopping amounts of Welsh Government funding towards the Laundry building community project and are bringing a beautiful derelict building back to life.

We partnered with Stonewall Cymru and joined the PRIDE Cymru parade as a team. We've been working on the laundry garden as part of the Woodland Routes to Wellbeing Project, which will be beautiful accessible space for any of our visitors to enjoy.

We joined colleagues and worked hard at Country File Live in the tea room. We surveyed approx. 2000 meters of walls around the property to check how they are holding up! Restored the beautiful painting of Jane Colchester with the help of the Friends of Tredegar House. We've welcomed almost around 70,000 visitors to the house and gardens so far, and they liked it, they really did, just see our social media!

Just to mention a few...

2019 will be no quieter for us and in fact there is a big ask of Team Tredegar as we hope to move forwards with our first phase of the Tredegar House Development Project which will explore how we work with people, our partnerships and welcome, give greater understanding on the conservation back log needs and see us try new approaches to our visitor experience. We will also see the completion of the Laundry Project, the start of the Brewhouse Tea Room renovation and hopefully the relocation of our Garden team. All while still welcoming our fabulous visitors.

THE MORGANS AND THE LONDON CONNECTION — THE OTHER TREDEGAR HOUSE By Rosemary Jackson

Continuing with my exploration of the London connection with the Morgans I walked further along Bow Road from Tredegar Square, leaving behind me Morgan Street, Tredegar Terrace and Aberfan Road, I came to the other Tredegar House.

In 1896 Godfrey Morgan donated Tredegar House a Georgian house on Bow Road as a Nurses Home. Training programmes for nurses were just beginning to be established and under Matron Eva Luckes the London Hospital established a pioneering seven-week course comprising lectures, practical work and an examination at the end.

However in 1911 Tredegar House was deemed not suitable for the new training and an appeal was launched to build a new purpose built home with Lord Tredegar giving the freehold to the London Hospital. This second building was also known as Tredegar House and was opened in 1912 by Queen Alexandra. The building is in the renaissance style - a revival of the architecture of the second half of the 17th century - with brick quoins, stone dentil cornice, timber sash windows and dormers with alternating triangular and segmental pediments. The building had a lecture room, dining room, sitting room and large 'practical classroom' along with bedrooms for 30 probationers and bed-sitting rooms for the sisters. Rowland Plumbe, the architect and Hospital Surveyor, himself contributed £5,000 to the cost of building work

The original building was pulled down. The current one continued to be involved with nurses training and accommodation until 1980 when it was sold and converted into flats. So if you have £610,000 to buy or £360 a week to rent you could live in this Tredegar House.

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
